
MLG origins & issues

- Reform of EU regional policy 1988 and the partnership principle
- The partnership principle meant that EU regional policy, for the first time, would be policy not just for the regions, but also by the regions (Nanetti 1996:64)
- "The multi-level governance concept thus contain both vertical and horizontal dimensions. 'Multi-level' referred to the increased interdependence of governments operation at different territorial levels, while 'governance' signalled the growing between governments and non-governmental actors at various territorial levels" (Bache & Flinders 2004:3).




- regional partnership should be viewed as a meeting place or a network for cross-sectoral co-operation


