Roundtable I: Reporting on human capital for territorial development: bringing together the experience of different stakeholders

The panel, composed by academics and practitioners in human capital and regional development, will discuss the needs of human capital locally and it's potential to provide applicable solutions to societal challenges – including positive externalities to non-economic outcomes. It will also address the new challenges for human capital, including the impact of globalization, innovation and demographic dynamics on skill needs (both cognitive and non-cognitive skills). Human capital spillover and networking will also be debated.

Roundtable II: How to measure human capital and impact on territorial development

The roundtable discusses methods and approaches to measure and enhance human capital stocks in support to local and regional growth. It will focus on how to measure human capital in a holistic context and on how to frame the human capital accounting of European regions according to specific territorial profile. The discussion will address methods and impact assessment tools that could, in the short and medium term, support the efforts of local and regional authorities in setting and achieving their targets concerning the enhancement and 'exploitation' of human capital.

Roundtable III: "People and institution centred territorial innovation systems"

The panel, composed by academics and practitioners in human capital and regional development, will explore how people and institutions with their capacities and capabilities can strengthen innovation in Europe's cities and regions. Research and policy have tended to focus heavily on 'technology' as the main driver of innovation systems, ignoring such factors as education, skills, social entrepreneurship and leadership, as well as the role of institutions (e.g. universities, local authorities, firms and civil society organisations) in mobilising these assets in 'quadruple helix' partnerships. These people dependent factors are often territorially rooted and are of particular importance to less developed regions.

Roundtable IV: Tomorrow's cities - innovative approaches to tackling social challenges

More than three quarters of Europeans live in cities and the importance of cities and urban areas in Europe will continue to grow. Cities are great places to start new business; they provide platforms for inter-cultural interactions and are incubators for innovation. This growth however, is also accompanied by complex challenges. Environmental problems, the ageing population, the risk of segregation, the influx of refugees and growing diversity are only a few examples of the issues that cities have to face and that have an impact on the development of their human capital. This roundtable uses an interactive discussion format to discuss future perspectives on cities with a focus on social challenges and innovative ways of tackling them.
