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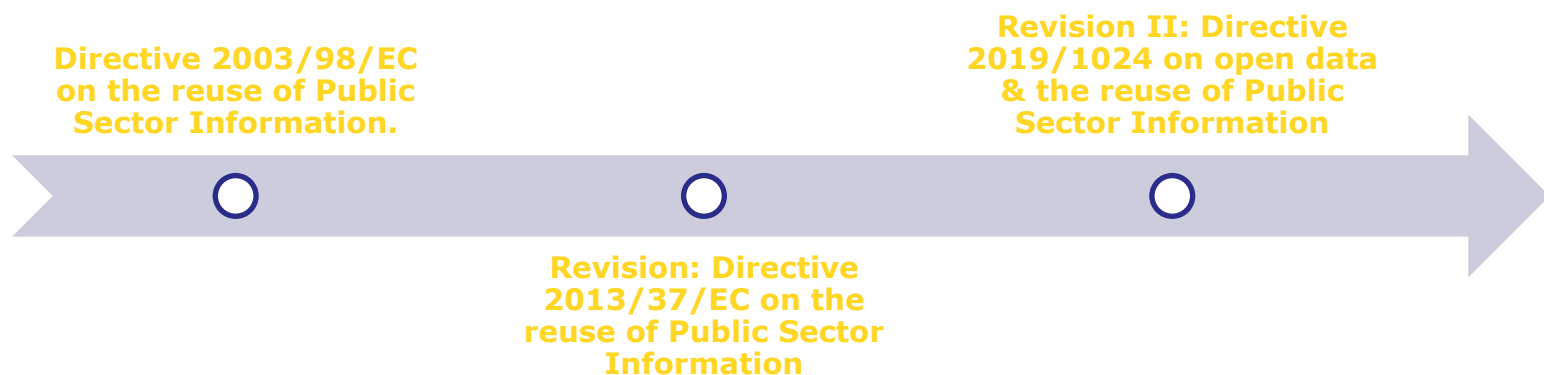

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PSI & Open-Data directives: some history

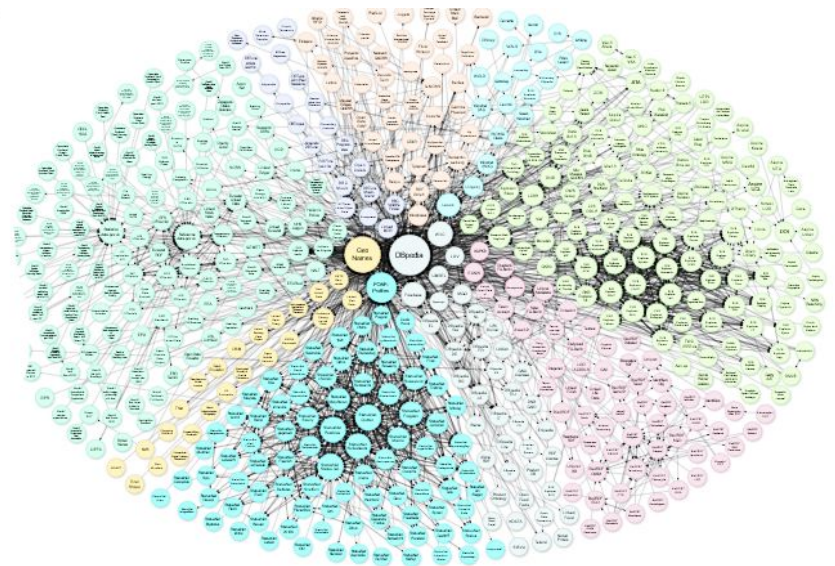


Digital single market:

Opportunities for data economy - from 52bln 2018 to 194bln in 2030

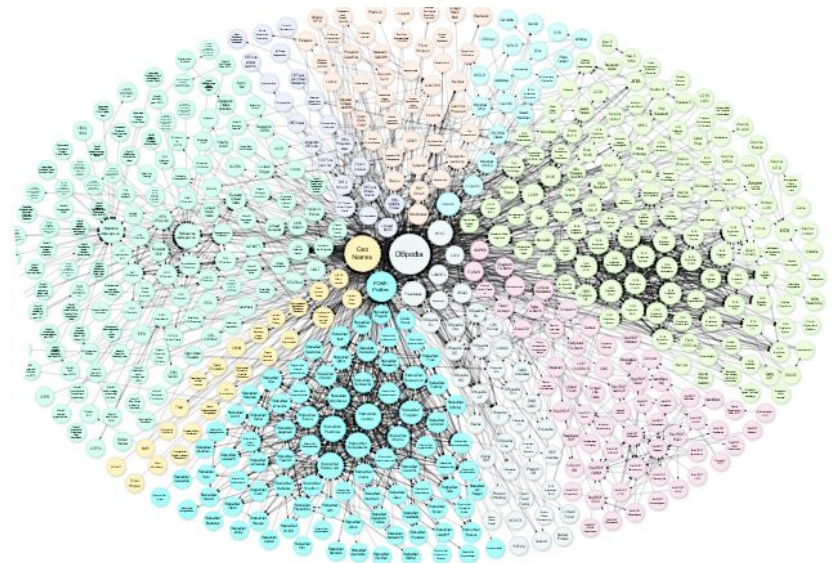
PSI Directive 2013: objectives

- Stimulates further development of a European market for services based on Public Sector Information
- Enhance the cross-border use and application of PSI in business processes, including publishing
- Strengthens competition in the internal market
- Addresses divergence as to reuse rules between Member States



Open Data & PSI Directive 2019: objectives

- Reduce market entry barriers, in particular for SMEs
- Minimize the risk of excessive first-mover advantage (more transparent public-private data arrangements)
- Increase business opportunities via application programming interfaces (APIs).
- Identification of high-value datasets → **Companies and company ownership**
- Bringing new types of public and publicly funded data → **Publicly funded research**
